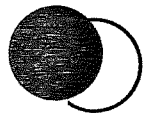

If the result is to be treated as an international or a national record those procedures has to be followed.

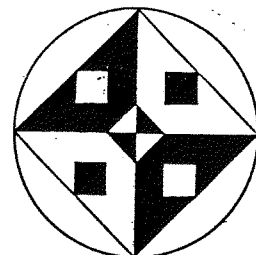
When results start reaching me I will make listings of each event regularly.

We have recieved no more suggestion for a logo. You can see it below. Please keep sending your suggestions so we get a lot to chose from when time for decision comes.



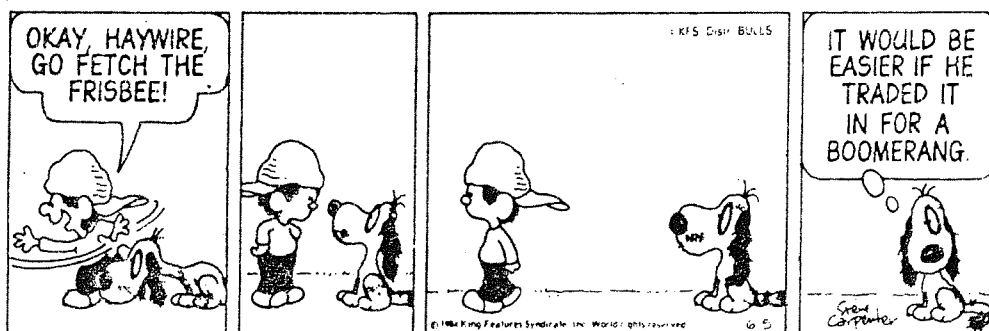

WDGC PRIZES

There has been some debate over the late payment of some of the prize-money from WDGC in Helsingborg last summer. Please see letters from Johan Lindgren and Charlie Mead. →

WFDF and the golf-tournament in Helsingborg.
=====

There seem to be some debate going on in america about the WFDF-involment in the golf-tournament in Helsingborg and the subsequent delay in payment of some of the prizemoney.

Let me first of all state that I no longer hold any position in the Swedish frisbee association. I devote all my "frisbee-time" to WFDF. It doesnt matter that I live in Sweden. The swedish association is just one of the member associations of WFDF.

Secondly, WFDF had nothing to do with the running of the tournament in Helsingborg. From the beginning the work, of both things, was a responsibility for the swedish association but when it all started I accepted to be in charge of the WFDF-part and from then on worked independantly of SFF and instead more closely with Charlie Mead. The tournament, on the other hand, was organized solely by Gerd Biesterfeld, wich now hasshowed not to be so good.

The WFDF-Congress became a part of the golf-tournament from the reason that representatives from most disc-countries would be in Helsingborg then. We tried to put the Congress before or after the tournament but it was impossible to organize with hotels, congress-room and so on.

The tournament has become a very problematic financial question for the swedish association. The loss is totalled to around 200 000 SKR (about \$25,000) Everyone can understand that this is a big problem for the swedish association. The situation is critical. Some of the prizemoney has been payed, but not all. The sweidsh association is definitely going to pay all the prizemoney but because of this loss it will take some time before the money exist. What Gerd did after the tournament was to pay the majority of the winners, leaving a few in the top. That can always be discussed, but that is how it was done.

Why did the tournament go so finacially wrong? It seems that Gerd Biesterfeld from personal reasons wanted the tournament to come true no matter the cost. He has said different things to different people at different times, kept letters secret, not kept promisies and so on. The sad thing is that the cost has to be covered by the swedish association, while Gerd benefit from the disc-licenses he acquired during the tournament. Some of this is proven some is well-grounded suspicions.

Gerd Biesterfeld no longer holds any position in the swedish association.

He wanted to become president of the organisation at the annual meeting in november but was outvoted by Sture Carlsson, Gothenburg, who is the new president.


The problems following the golf-tournament is going to be tough for the swedish association to cope with, but the rest of the disc-world can sit back and enjoy the success of the tournament. A few people has not been payed yet but they will.

When it was clear that all the prizes could not be payed at once Gerd promised to inform the players concern, and later he reported that he had done that, but apparently he has not done so.

Some people are waiting for their money, but the swedish association assures me that it will be payed as soon as possible. They are working on several different financial solutions and I believe that it will be solved soon. When that is taken care of only the swedes has to worry about how to cover the loss on a long term basis.

The most important thing in all this is that our mutual interest in creating WFDF ^(not) is hampered. WFDF has nothing to do with the actual running of the tournament. Neither did WFDF hold any authority before the conclusion of the Congress to act in any way. If you want you can give that authority to WFDF ^(in the future) by joining the federation. I will certainly follow the development here in Sweden and WFDF will surely check future organizers of big tournaments so problems like this are avoided.

Please contact me at once if there's still any questions or doubts around this. I will be happy to answer any questions I can or investigate any questions I dont know the answer to. This is one of the things WFDF is there for.

During the past month I have recieved reports from Sweden and the USA concerning the non-payment of prize-money to competitors who attended the world Disc Golf Championships in helsingborg, Sweden august 1985. Whilst in no way condoning the behaviour of the organisers of the championship I must point out, as the WFDF-secretary Johan Lindgren already has, that the WFDF played no part in the organisation of this tournament.

However, for the uninformed, I feel that, as a president of WFDF, I must make a stronger point about the lack of ties between the WFDF and the WDGC in Helsingborg. The case is that WFDF did not exist before the 1st WFDF Congress, which, only coincidentally, was held at the same time as the WDGC, being the only disc tournament in 1985 which would attract a truly representative international playing field. WFDF could not threfore, either officially sanction or provide constitutional control over such an event. This will, of course, not be the case with future World Championships in any disc discipline.

Before August 17th 1985 there was no WFDF board, and any unilateral action by any disc playing individual outside of the immediate organising committee of the WDGC would have been seen as an unwarranted intrusion; not based on o constitutional conviction of malpractice. Again, since the election of the WFDF Board and its committees, any investigation of a World Championships Organising Committee's activities falls within the constitutional scope of WFDF under its Statutes.

I can assure the PDGA Board that the WFDF does not take the transgression of payments lightly. We will be taking every step possible to not only recover the monies owed, but to ensure that those responsible face up to the consequences of their actions. We shall also be taking steps to ensure that this situation does not occur again in the future tournaments. There is no conflict of interest between WFDF and WDGC, or between WFDF and PDGA, and we are all in a position to helt and support each other.

I hope that the actions of the WFDF Board, in supporting those players who have been the unwitting victims of obvious mismanagement on the part of the WDGC organisers, will convince the PDGA Board that WFDF is and was in no way responsible for this situation.

WFDF exists to encourage all forms of disc play worldwide, and to support all those who participate in disc sports at all levels. WFDF is not a promotion agency for tournaments; it exists as a way of sanctioning, standardising and controlling those agents who wish to promote disc tournaments, both through its member associations and its specialist committees. This is surely for the good of all concerned in every type of disc play, but especially disc golf where, as we have seen in the past on numerous occasions, players have been let down by the unfulfilled promies of the promoters.

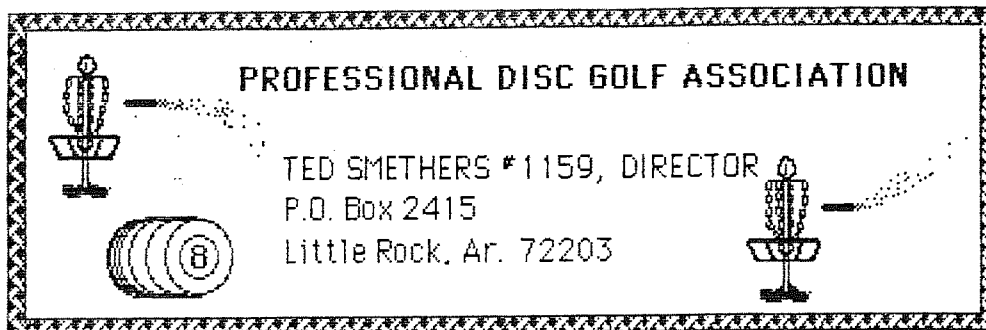

I am pleased to offer the following proposal for the 1986 WFDF World Disc Golf Championship tournament. The PDGA offers the PDGA Championship tournament that when combined with the WFDF World Disc Golf Championship would be an undisputed world championship. This tournament will be held regardless of your decision.

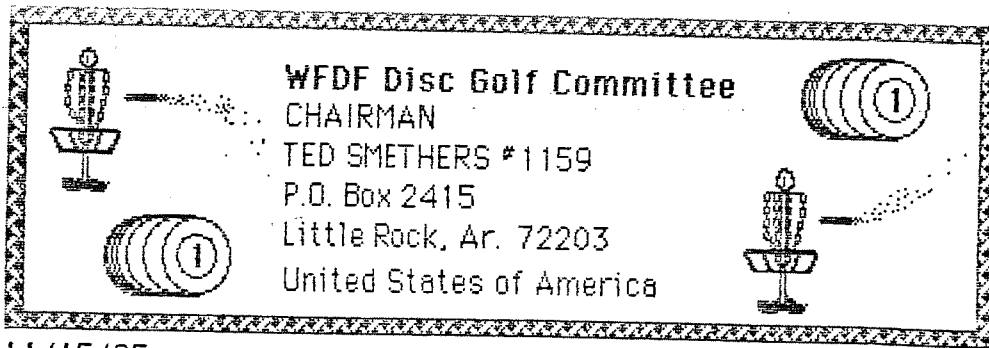
McAlpine Greenway Park and Latta Park. Two portable 18 DGA Pole-Holeø courses will be used along with a new permanent 18 DGA Pole-Holeø course. Each course will be designed by experts in Disc Golf Course design and will be supervised by the PDGA Course Design Committee. The parks provide a diverse landscape of hills, trees, and beautiful lawn. Let there be no doubt as to the quality of the courses.

Cost per player is set at \$60 each and will include all entry fees with no additional purse booster. Each entrant will receive a package of discs and related products as yet undetermined. The cost to run the tournament is not precisely budgeted at this time but is expected to be less than \$2,000. Prize money in addition to that obtained from the entry fees has not been raised at this time. However, the tournament promoter is experienced and prospects are good that a substantial purse will be raised. His plan is to obtain one large sponsor of \$20,000 - half of which will pay for the installation of one disc golf course and the other half for the cash purse. He also plans to obtain 20 smaller sponsors of \$500 each - all funds to the purse. When added to the anticipated \$10,000 from the entry fees, total purse is expected to be approximately \$30,000. As soon as the purse is finalized, it will be announced and will not be reduced.

Tournament Format:

Maximum of 288 entrants will play 2 rounds per day for 2 days(Thursday & Friday) - 18 holes per round. A cut to top 72 players (+ ties) on day 3 will go to new course to play 18 holes. Final round of 9 holes for top 4 (+ ties). Awards ceremony. Doubles will be played on Wednesday and a consolation round for players cut will be played on Saturday morning. Sunday is open for travel. This format is preliminary and may be adjusted by the Tournament Standards Committee. No cut will be made until all players have completed 54 holes.

This tournament will result in the installation of at least 1 permanent disc golf course and possibly 2. The local community, from the mayor to the parks department, is very excited about the event and will be participating in the promotional effort. It is expected that the local media will cover the tournament as a sporting event with regular press and TV/Radio coverage.

Subject: Disc Golf

I want to thank you for electing me to head the Disc Golf Committee for the World Flying Disc Federation. I am sorry I was unable to attend the WDGC in Helsingborg last August. My support for WFDF is unwavering and I am excited about the potential for Disc Golf. I would like to outline my plans for this committee and I would like you to write me with your ideas and comments.

1. WFDF needs a World Disc Golf Tour. I have enclosed a copy of the PDGA Pro Tour which includes the USA, Canada, and one tournament in Denmark. I have also enclosed a form by which each of you can register one or more tournaments. Ideally I would like to set up one coordinator for each continent. To do this I must know who each of you would recommend as the coordinator for your continent. I hope that most of you will recommend the same person and then I will not have to conduct a vote. If needed, I will write you with the finalists and request your vote. In the meantime I will try to maintain the list of all tournaments and eliminate conflicts where I can. As soon as I can get a coordinator for each continent, I will turn the responsibilities for scheduling each continent to that person who will in turn inform me of the schedule so that I can maintain a complete listing. This schedule will be supplied on a regular basis to the WFDF Newsletter for publication.
2. WFDF needs a complete directory of all Disc Golf Courses. I already maintain a computerized data base of all disc golf courses in North America. This can easily be expanded to include the rest of the world. The PDGA plans to have this directory published in 1986 and there is no reason why this cannot include all the world's courses. Enclosed is an input form for you to fill out on each course you are aware of.
3. I will leave the selection of the WDGC site up to the WFDF President and Board. I have submitted a proposal to Charlie Langdon-Meade for the WDGC in Charlotte, North Carolina, USA, on July 23-26 on behalf of the PDGA. Also I do not have a suggestion for the qualification for attendance at the WDGC at this time. I would like to hear from each of you on this issue. It will be dealt with later.

4. Course Design Standards. I have taken the PDGA standards and re-written them for your review and approval. I will try to incorporate any and all comments. Please do not restrict listings in the course directory to only those courses that comply with these standards. The directory should include all courses. Let's identify them all first and then we can go about determining compliance with the standards when they are approved.

5. Disc Golf Rules of Play. Currently the PDGA is just about to complete a revision of the rules of play. Mostly the rules are re-formatted and re-written to be easier to understand and to cover some areas that were left out during the original writing. (Did you know that the rules do not cover how to complete a hole?) I will forward a copy of the rules to the rules committee in about 1 month.

Finally I cannot do all that needs to be done alone. I would like to ask for volunteers to help with this committee.

I will be looking forward to hearing from each of you.

**WORLD FLYING DISC FEDERATION DISC GOLF COURSE STANDARDS
(PROPOSED) 11/17/85**

The following standards are to be used to both design new and to modify existing disc golf courses. The intent is to maintain a consistent design of the highest quality for all disc golf courses.

1. The course must have a total length, as determined by the sum of the distance from the tee to the hole, for all holes not to be less than 685 meters for 9 holes or 1350 meters for 18 holes and not to exceed 850 meters for 9 holes or 1830 meters for 18 holes.
2. At least 1 hole per 9 should exceed 100 meters, but none should be less than 40 meters, regardless of terrain.
3. At least 3 holes per 9 should require a left curve throw and 3 holes per 9 should require a right curve throw.
4. The course must be design to facilitate tournament play. The following are required for this:
 - a) The fairway of one hole must not cross or overlap the fairway of another hole.
 - b) The next tee pad must be placed at a right angle from the fairway of the last hole and at least 10 meters away from the nearest hole.
 - c) Fairways must not cross streets that cannot be closed or pedestrian walks that are frequently used.
 - d) Wherever possible allowances should be made for spectators by separating holes enough to allow the crowd to view the game without interfering.
5. Tee signs should indicate distance the preferred flight path and must show all mandatory dog-legs and out-of-bounds area.
6. Tee areas must allow for safety of the player by having no obstructions within 3 meters of the end of the pad and on both sides. The surface must be flat and the transition from pad to soil should be smooth.
7. There may not be more than one mandatory on any single hole. There must not be more than 2 mandatories per 9 holes, and should be discouraged from use whenever the natural terrain provides adequate obstacles.

KEEPING SCORE

Ultimate Conditioner

The sport is Ultimate Frisbee, and the nation's best teams go by such names as the Tunas, Kaboom, the Boston Rude Boys, Capital Offenders of Ground Zero, Flying Circus, Chain Lightning, Windy City, the Fishheads, the Condors and Crimes of Passion. The athletes are among the best conditioned in any sport, and there are no egomaniacs.

Ultimate combines rudiments of football, soccer and basketball, and a player will run four to five miles during a match. Except for the tossing and catching of the plastic disc, the game bears little resemblance to the Frisbee frolicking one might expect to see in a public park. Even the late Ashley Whippet, the greatest canine catcher of 'em all, would have no place in this sport—unless it would be the halftime show.

The game of Ultimate was invented in 1968 by youngsters at Columbia High School in Maplewood, N.J., who converted the school's parking lot to a playing field. On November 6, 1972, which was 103 years to the day Princeton and Rutgers met in New Brunswick, N.J., in the first collegiate football game, the colleges crossed Frisbees on the same site in Ultimate's first intercollegiate game.

Since 1978, the Ultimate Players Association, which now encompasses more than 900 teams, has conducted a national championship. Women have played for a national title since 1981. The preliminary rounds in this year's finals, which bear the misnomer of Penultimate of Ultimate, were scheduled October 25-26 on the mall in the nation's capital, alongside the Reflecting Pool between the Washington Monument and the Lincoln Memorial. The Final Four were to move to T.C. Williams High School in Alexandria, Va., for the tournament wind-up October 27. Ten men's teams and five women's squads qualified for the finals.

Ultimate is played by seven-man sides on a field 70 yards long and 40 yards wide, with 25-yard end zones. Goals are scored when a player makes a catch in the end zone, and the first team to 21, with at least a two-goal margin, is the winner. A player who catches the disc cannot run, but must immediately establish a pivot-foot position and try to get off a pass within 10 seconds.

It's a non-contact sport, and players call their own fouls, which result in turnovers. A defensive player must give his man space, just as in basketball. Most fouls are for hacking, traveling, setting illegal picks or stalling—failing to get a pass away in time. The latter penalty occurs when the defender stands over his man and conducts a stall count ("one thousand one, one thousand two") up to 10.

"Calling our own fouls is one of the unique features of the game, although there is considerable factioning within the sport for referees," said Dee Rambeau, co-coach of the St. Louis Tunas, defending national champions. Larry Schindel of White Plains, Md., assistant to the director of the UPA, says the no-referee system "creates an etiquette and spirit of sportsmanship" not found in other sports.

Ultimate teams normally work the disc toward the goal with a series of short passes, but "bombs" of 60 to 100 yards are not uncommon. The Tunas, for example, boast the deep threat of Tom Heimann to Rambeau. Heimann easily can toss the Frisbee 80 yards and land it in a five-foot target area.

Who are Ultimate's players? Lots of them are yuppies. Most of them are in their 20s. They may have backgrounds in college sports, but there are no "big-name" athletes. According to Heimann, "An athlete of that stature probably has an ego problem. He wouldn't be able to stand up to 100 practices a year, running five to 10 miles a day, with little recognition."

The Tunas won the 1984 championship in Santa Barbara, Calif., beating the San Francisco Flying Circus in the title game. The women's title went to the Condors of Santa Barbara over the Fishheads of Michigan State.

So what's a Tuna? As Heimann said, "It all goes back to a Robin Williams comedy routine. He did a skit in which some dolphins were caught in tuna nets and Williams anthropomorphized the situation in a funny voice, saying, 'I'm not a tuna.' One of our players could do a good impression of that voice, so we started calling him 'Tuna.' Then, when it came time for us to name our team, we decided on the Tunas."

Anthropomorphism? Factioning? No egos? Are these guys really athletes?

The World Flying Disc Federation agrees to sanction and support this tournament as a part of the official WFDF Disc Golf Tour, and to maintain a permanent record of the results of this tournament. The applicant, as Tournament Director, agrees to direct the tournament at this course on the agreed date, and further agrees to the following:

1. To strictly enforce the WFDF Rules of Play and Technical Standards for Equipment used in play.
2. To provide the results of the tournament including the names, addresses, and order of finish of all WFDF members.
3. To distribute prize money as follows:
 - a. No more than 10% to the Tournament Director for fees.
 - b. Return \$1.00(USA) per entrant donation to the WFDF Treasurer for Tour expenses.
 - c. The balance to the top third of each division, except for reasonable expenses incurred.
 - d. If the tournament is halted due to foul weather before 36 holes have been completed by all Pro players, all entry money except the Tourney Directors' percentage shall be returned and the tournament cancelled.
4. Play shall consist of at least 54 holes before a cut is made, or 36 holes when play has been suspended by foul weather in accordance with WFDF Rules of Play.
5. Players shall be randomly grouped for the first round of play. Thereafter, foursomes shall be grouped according to the cumulative scores. Leaders shall always begin on hole number one.
6. A player may enter and play in only one division per tournament.
7. By failing to meet the terms of this agreement, the Tournament Director understands that he/she may be subject to sanctions up to and including loss of the opportunity to direct future WFDF Tour Tournaments.

WFDF WORLD TOUR AGREEMENT:

This past summer we had a small tournament in Fort Smith, Arkansas and there I met an exchange student from Finland. He had never played Disc Golf before coming to this country and this was his first tournament. When I learned that he would be heading home soon I pulled out my copy of the EFDF Newsletter and told him about a tournament in Helsinki. It turned out that he was going to be passing thru there at about the time of the tournament, I later learned that he did in fact re-arrange his schedule to make the tournament. Who would have guessed that someone would find out about a tournament on the other side of the globe and go to it from Arkansas! That is what the PDGA Pro Tour has done for North America and what the WFDF World Tour can do for the planet earth! To make this work we must schedule our tournaments at least one(1) year in advance. What I am asking is for each of you to schedule your disc golf tournaments now for all of 1986. Attached is a form for you to sign and send to me so that I can add it to the schedule. Completing the form is simple:

1. Write in the date/s of the tournament (make copies for more than one tournament).
2. Write in the name of the course (what park it is in).
3. Write down the city, state & country. This should provide enough information so that the players will know where it is.
4. If the tournament has a name such as 3rd Annual Disc Golf Classic provide that.
5. Write in the name, address & phone # of the person who will be directing the tournament, hopefully that will be the same person who fills out this form. Then feel free to write any other short notes about the upcoming event, prize money, disc & T-shirt, free beer or whatever.
6. read the requirements and sign it. Then mail it to me. In the future I will have you mail it to the Continent Coordinator who will then forward it on to me.

I will enter it into the schedule and check it for any obvious conflicts. It is important is that you *provide me with information on the areas or countries that normally will send players to your tournament.* I do not know if the players in France usually go to the tournaments in West Germany for instance. But obviously two tournaments in France on the same weekend would be a conflict. With your help I will do the best I can to eliminate conflicts until we can get a Coordinator for each continent who will be in a better position to deal with these problems:

The sooner you complete the form and return it the better off you are as it will be first come first serve for the best weekends. I will pass along the schedule to both the EFDF & WFDF newsletters on a regular basis.

DISC GOLF COURSE REGISTRATION FORM

My current data base has 211 Disc Golf Courses in it. About half have all of the information shown on this form. The rest have some of portion incomplete. If you do not have a professionally drawn layout of your disc golf course send along a rough sketch. If you would like to have your rough sketch re-drawn professionally send \$25 with it. Dave Stembel (the guy who does the cross sections of discs) will re-draw it using a standard set of symbols and return you a professional quality drawing. To complete the form:

1. Park/Course Name. This the name of the park where the course is.
2. City/State/Country. Self explanatory.
3. Directions to the course. Assume that the average player can find your city, how does he/she find the course once there. Provide street names and North/South/East/West orientation.
4. Special Notes about Scheduling. This is where you can provide the information needed to avoid conflicts and about when you will allways have your annual tournaments. Example. Mid-August Classic is allways the second weekend in August draws from Illinois, Iowa, Ohio & Missouri.
5. Course Pro Name, Address & Phone *. This is the person recognized locally as the contact for that course. It is usually the same person who puts on the tournaments and conducts the local activities.
6. Number & Type Holes; Tee Pads. I will accept object courses into the directory as long as they are established courses with tee signs, etc.
Example. 18-DGA Pole Holes 4X10 Concrete tee pads
7. Length of course. Total length of the course which is the sum of the lengths of each hole as measured from the tee pad to the hole. I will convert from meters to feet.
8. Number of holes less than 90meters; 90 to 120meters; over 120meters. This gives an idea of the variation of the holes in the course.
9. Name of Local Club. Sometimes a dispute arises over who is the course pro at a course, in these instances it is to be decided by the Local Club, I need to know who that is.
10. Name of course designer. Historical information on who designed the course.
11. Course description. This is your chance to brag about your course and tell everyone what a great place it is to play disc golf. Information on restrooms, parking, food & drink is also useful as well as the description of the terrain, trees and shrubs. Provide a copy of your layout drawing if one is available.

Please provide as much information as you can and try to do it in English. I have access to translations for Spanish, French, German, and Chinese. But it will be difficult. I will try to have the directory available sometime in 1986. I'm looking forward to your input.
